## **OPERATIONS UPDATE**

ShelterBox currently has ongoing deployments in Pakistan, Haiti, Guatemala and Niger. Here is a brief update on our operations in these regions.

### Pakistan

We continue to work with our key partners, NRSP and World Vision, to ensure that our operations in Pakistan can run smoothly. Water purification systems are being distributed in partnership with the Pakistani and German Red Crescent Societies. The following aid has been committed with the majority distributed and a small percentage still in transit or awaiting distribution:

2,224 full ShelterBoxes (250 awaiting dispatch from UK) 9,323 tents 20,000 water purifiers 10,000 water carriers

#### Haiti

ShelterBox Response Teams remain in Haiti to monitor ongoing distribution with partners and are working to clear the final deployment of boxes that have been designated to the country. ShelterBox's response to the Haiti disaster has seen approximately 27,217 ShelterBoxes distributed throughout the ravaged country, directly assisting over 250,000 Haitian victims during times of great hardship.


#### Guatemala

Deadly mudslides have recently ravaged Guatemala, leaving thousands homeless and the nation in a state of disaster. 200 ShelterBoxes will arrive in the country shortly, with a further 200 in transit. There have been several obstacles facing deployment, as the Trans American highway is closed and freight options have been difficult. As the rains in Guatemala are set to continue and are predicted to be the worst in 80 years, we are anticipating a large need for deployment to come.

#### Niger

In late August, Niger experienced its worst flooding in 80 years, leaving thousands of people homeless. The ShelterBox team was quick to respond and 200 boxes have arrived in the country, with 50 distributed so far. Two UK ShelterBox SRT members are currently in Niger, travelling to the east where there is a great need for humanitarian assistance. A further 200 ShelterBoxes and four school boxes are en route to the ravaged country and the situation will be assessed on an ongoing basis.





# WHAT'S IT LIKE TO BE A SHELTERBOX RESPONSE TEAM VOLUNTEER?

SheterBox Response Team members (SRTs) are vital to our operations at ShelterBox, providing assistance where it's needed most – at the scene of an international disaster.

Peter Pearce, the ShelterBox Response Team Leader from New South Wales, has been a volunteer SRT on several occasions and has been involved in deployments in Sudan, Rwanda, the Congo and the Philippines. He believes that SRTs are what distinguishes ShelterBox from other international aid organizations.

"Because SRTs are on site during a disaster, we can ensure that that the boxes are reaching the right destination in the right way. This means that people can be assured that their donations are directly helping the cause," said Peter.

Peter believes that the greatest aspect of being an SRT volunteer is the opportunity to make real difference to the lives of disaster victims, stating that it is rewarding to leave an area knowing that you have housed and protected a group of people. "An SRT's job is to provide shelter, warmth and dignity to victims of disasters," said Peter. "And that's an important and worthwhile responsibility."

### Sound intriguing?

SRTs are indispensable assets to ShelterBox as they assist in managing operations at the scene of a disaster and as ShelterBox's operations grow, so does the demand for volunteers.

So what qualities do you need to be a member of a SRT? Volunteers must be hard working, resourceful, fit and self sufficient, with the ability to make the right decisions under pressure. They are often deployed at short notice to remote corners of the globe, where they are often confronted with the devastating aftermath of a disaster.

## SHELTERBOX RESPONDING TO RECENT LANDSLIDES IN MEXICO

ShelterBox are responding to a devastating triple pronged disaster in Southern Mexico. Recent flooding combined with the damage caused from Hurricanes Karl and Matthew and landslides in the region have resulted in a desperate need for disaster relief.

A three person ShelterBox Response Team is being dispatched this week and will be heading to the Oaxaca region of Southern Mexico where recent landslide damage has been particularly severe. Upon their arrival they will partner up with local Mexican Rotarian groups. The SRT members will be working closely with the ShelterBox operations team to coordinate their response and assess where disaster relief is most needed.

"Mexico is a country that repeatedly suffers from natural disasters," said ShelterBox Australia Board Member, John Cameron.

"Our thoughts go out to all of those who have been affected by the recent events and we hope aid can be delivered quickly to assist the disaster areas," he added.

The couple has been passionate about garnering support and has done so by raising awareness about the ShelterBox cause and how it is benefitting disaster victims.




ShelterBox appreciates the ongoing dedication of District Representatives and understands that the organisation would not be able to operate without the important donations that they secure.
